Communication & language	The development of children's spoken language underpins all seven areas of learning and development. By commenting on what children are interested in or doing and echoing back what they say with new vocabulary added, practitioners will build children's language effectively.

Personal, social & emotional	Children's personal, social and emotional development (PSED) is crucial for children to lead healthy and happy lives, and is fundamental to their cognitive development.

Physical development	Physical activity is vital in children's all-round development, enabling them to pursue happy, healthy and active lives.
C/R - <i>CL</i>	<ul> <li>Acting out the story to support core strength, stability, balance, special awareness, coordination and agility</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Using the story to support our fine motor skills such as play dough, sensory trays, drawing etc.</li> </ul>

Literacy	It is crucial for children to develop a life-long love of reading. Reading consists of two dimensions: language comprehension and word reading
C/R - <i>CL</i>	<ul> <li>Read the book twice a day at a minimum and also outside of set story times</li> <li>Create story maps</li> </ul>
	Opportunities to explore fiction, non-fiction, rhymes, songs and poems

Mathematics	It is important that the curriculum includes rich opportunities for children to develop their spatial reasoning skills across all areas of mathematics
C/R - <i>CL</i>	Incorporate mathematics in our environments visually and through practise

Understanding the world	Understanding the world involves guiding children to make sense of their physical world and their community
C/R - CL, EAD	<ul> <li>Using story making to explore the physical world, different people, faiths and cultures and our community</li> <li>Embed the children's cultural capital into daily routines</li> <li>Introduce awareness for safety (stranger danger, road safety etc.)</li> </ul>

Expressive arts and design	The development of children's artistic and cultural awareness supports their imagination and creativity.
C/R - <i>CL, UW</i>	<ul> <li>Building self-expression through role play and imaginative play using small world, home corners etc.</li> </ul>
	Singing songs and rhymes
	<ul> <li>Explore the arts through a wide range of media and materials such as dance, song and mark making</li> </ul>
